

Bulgarian Rising Suppressed.

CITY HISTORY CLUB EXHIBITION

Work Done by Its Young Members Shown at University Settlement.

The City History Club, founded by Mrs. Robert Abbe three years ago, gave an exhibition yesterday afternoon at the University Settlement of the work the children who have been studying this city's history from the days of New Amsterdam have done during the past year.

There are now 110 classes, all in the poorer districts of the city, and connected with schools, churches, missions, and settlements. The number of children has increased from 700 the first year to 2,000, all with an enthusiastic interest in the work. They not only study pictures and maps, but are taken to different places in the city to see the actual spots where great historical events took place.

The children from all the classes competed for the prizes, and eight were given, principally books. These were for essays, note books, and a prize song and the music for it. This was one of the most interesting features of the exhibition. Ida Primoff, a little Hester Street girl, wrote the words which took the prize for the song. The first verse reads:

To thee, first city of our land,
With hearts and voices blending,
We raise a loyal song of praise
In strains of love unending.

The refrain is:

New York, New York, our city loved,
To thee in praise we sing,
Let every loyal heart and voice
Its loving tribute bring.

The author is to receive as a prize a book which she said was of all others the one for which she most longed, Elbert Hubbard's "Little Journeys to the Homes of Famous Statesmen." The music, said to be excellent, was composed by Almeda Adams.

An interesting feature of the exhibition was a case of books containing Valentine's manuals from 1842 to 1861, almost complete, collected with a number of other books by an Italian boy, Gaetano Martoralli. He knew that they contained an interesting history of New York, and he has worked hard to make this collection for himself.

Mrs. Robert Abbe distributed part of the prizes last night, and the others will be distributed this morning.

The Woman's Municipal League also had an exhibition showing the work it had done in lectures.
